Experiencing St. Andrew's



We are a close-knit congregation that works to share the love of God across political, socio-economic, and the generational spectrum. We are cradle Episcopalians who have worshiped at St. Andrew's for 40 years and we are people new to Greencastle and to this denomination. Many of us work together, volunteer together, live near each other, or are involved in activities for each others' children. We value supporting each other in good times and bad and always demonstrating hospitality to visitors and newcomers.



You can see we serve a lot more than coffee after our weekly service!

Coffee hour is ministry time. We check in on each other and form

bonds with those who aren't necessarily in our daily lives.





At Christmas time the whole parish, young and old take part in the 'Greening of the Church' and on Christmas Eve the children place the baby Jesus in the manager. A particularly talented congregant writes and directs a new Christmas play for our children to perform every year!











It is important for us to create events for everyone! The Fun and Fellowship Ministry group organizes regular activities which include: Soup and Game Night, Mothers' Group, parking lot cookouts, Men's Night Out, Friends Luncheons, International Dinners, and a St. Patrick's Day event supporting our Bishop Cate Waynick Scholarships for the children to attend Waycross camp. Many young St. Andrew families annually vacation in Michigan together and send their

youth to Waycross Camp.
























Our tradition is for the children to lead the Palm Sunday procession. Following a festive Easter service, we have an Easter egg hunt for the children and a parish brunch out in our Memorial Garden space complete with mimosas.





Worship



We look to our worship to immerse us in beauty, mystery, and grace while placing an emphasis on simplicity and inclusivity. The sanctuary is a sacred space, where worshipers prepare themselves for the service in (mostly) quiet contemplation. Our church has grown considerably in the last seven years and many of our newer members come from other denominations. It is important to us to preserve our liturgy and yet make it accessible to those not



accustomed to juggling books. We consider it an act of loving hospitality to provide a service booklet which includes the liturgy, service music, prayer requests, and hymns which may not be in our hymnals.

Our liturgy is primarily Rite II from the Book of Common Prayer 1979, however, we have enjoyed the inclusion of prayers from Enriching Our Worship and The New Zealand Prayer Book. We use the Revised Common Lectionary for scripture readings, often enhancing our understanding with Invitatory prayers and Offertory scriptures from



contemporary translations (e.g. The Message, Common English Bible, and The Good News Bible/Today's English Version).

On Sunday mornings, the children gather in The Murray Suite for Sunday school time. There is a happy burst of children as they join the worship service during the Peace and remain so that everyone can come to the Lord's






Table together. We also have an area for the young children in the narthex with books and crafts for those who are a little too young to be comfortable in the pews for very long.





Our worship schedule is a single Liturgy of the Word and Eucharist at 10:15 a.m. on Sundays. At Christmas our main worship is a 7:00 p.m. family-friendly service, with a concert of Christmas music thirty minutes before the service. Ash Wednesday, Holy Week, and other special feast days have varied from traditional to less-formal. We are open to experiencing

these sacred days in a variety of ways. During the Covid pandemic, we have had the wonderful opportunity to gather and worship together on Zoom and continue our ministries of fellowship and outreach in our community in new, creative ways while practicing social distancing.





Music



"I had lived in Greencastle for many years without finding a church. The first time I attended St. Andrew's was for a Christmas Eve service with a beautiful pre-service concert. When I heard the music, I knew I had found a church home."

Music is a fundamental part of our worship and identity at St. Andrew's. During our Holy Conversations, music was repeatedly mentioned as one of the most meaningful aspects of weekly service and connecting to God. Our parishioners are musicians and music lovers. Several members of our congregation form our choir each week and serve as cantors. In addition to The Hymnal 1982, we make regular use of Wonder, Love, and Praise and

music from other sources such as Taizé, Lift Every Voice and Sing: An African

American Hymnal and traditional American hymnody. Adults and children play their brass instruments, the organ, piano, regular and Native American flutes, and harp. Students from the nearby DePauw University also regularly join our choir and have served as section leaders.





First time visitors to St. Andrew's are often stunned to hear a \$500,000+ organ with 1,182 pipes played by our world-class organist, Albrecht von Gaudecker. You can spot these first-timers because they just can't resist turning around in their pews to see what is going on up in our choir loft! What a treat...and we get to enjoy this every Sunday.

In 1998, a fire, which started in the choir loft, destroyed our pipe organ and severely damaged the narthex and nave. Unveiled in 2002, we were able to build a new J. Zamberlan Organ Opus 1 (with vintage pipes from two 19th century organs, augmented by new pipework) thanks to the generous gifts of current and former parishioners, graduates of DePauw's School of Music, and others. We even had some money left over to start a small maintenance fund.



"Music helps me experience worship; it moves me and makes me feel thankful. We are really blessed to have such musical talent." DePauw's Chamber Singers now perform their annual Festival of Lessons and Carols at St. Andrew's because of our organ and organist; it is a highlight of the Christmas season for parishioners and non-parishioners alike.

Community Outreach



Non-Food Pantry A monthly ministry that has run for over 10 years providing lunch and essential products (for example, householder cleaners, paper products, and personal hygiene items) that are not included in food assistance programs. We regularly serve 300-400 individuals from Putnam County and have reached

thousands with this program.









Summer Enrichment Program A nearly 35 year-old program for at-risk children from our community schools founded by two members of St. Andrew's. The SEP gives about 60 children, grades 1-5, the opportunity in the first five weeks of summer to learn while playing. Members of St. Andrew's have and continue to serve as Program Directors, Education Directors, Counselors and Mentors. Many of the special programs and activities are presented by members of the church.

Our newest program brings monthly Communion services to a retirement and rehabilitation community, whose residents expressed a desire to participate in church life. We sing, bring treats, and share the gift of the Eucharist with our sisters and brothers suffering from memory loss and other degenerative conditions.




Finances



History and Building


In February 1938 a group of about 25 people, including townspeople, DePauw faculty and students came together to talk about an Episcopal Mission being established in Greencastle. On Ash Wednesday in 1939, then Bishop Kirchhoffer came to Greencastle to conduct his first service outside of Indianapolis. At the end of the school year the Mission rented the house at 720 South Locust Street, formerly the University Infirmary, for fifteen dollars per month.



Eli Lilly was born in Greencastle, he lived here and he opened his first drug store on the southeast corner of the downtown courthouse square. Fast forward to March 21, 1951 and an application was sent to Lilly Endowment, asking for funding for the construction of St. Andrew's Church. On May 15, 1951 Lilly Endowment sent a check for \$83,000 to Laurel Turk, a nationally

known DePauw Spanish professor and the chair of the St. Andrew's Finance and Construction Committees. (The Turk family has established an endowment to support the daily operations at St. Andrew's.)

Moving to more recent history, on July 12, 1998 a fire broke out in the choir loft and destroyed our pipe organ and severely damaged the narthex and nave. It was unfortunate, but it means today St. Andrew's has a fully restored church. As you will read elsewhere in our profile, in 2015 St. Andrew's undertook a \$250,000 renovation to add a second floor to our fellowship hall to accommodate our growing number of youth. A ten-year \$100,000 loan from the diocese was paid off in 4 years. Once again St. Andrew's is debt free.



Today, the church has grown to 112 members and 26 children. St. Andrew's may be the most progressive church here in Putnam County. St. Andrew's strives to provide an everyday atmosphere of inclusion and cooperation in its community care, allowing us to have authentic moments of joy, humor and grace.
